6-Month Study Launched to Manage Change



CHESTNUT HILL RESIDENTIAL CONSERVATION, PRESERVATION + DEVELOPMENT STUDY 2017

The Chestnut Hill Conservancy has secured a catalytic grant from the [William Penn Foundation's Watershed Protection program](#) to help broaden efforts to protect the Wissahickon Watershed from increasing development pressures. In addition to strengthening our easement program, this grant is funding a collaborative planning effort to identify conservation and preservation priorities and guide future development. The project kicked off last week and will be completed by the end of May, although some results will be available at the April 21st Visionaries Roundtable. [READ MORE](#)



It's captured the imaginations (and memories) of so many people!



Skating on the frozen Wissahickon Creek has been a popular pastime for well over a century. This 1939 photograph taken from on top of the Valley Green Road Bridge over the Wissahickon facing down the Creek shows many ice skaters enjoying a mid-morning skate on its smooth surface. As the 20th century progressed, ice skaters found themselves frustrated as an increasingly-polluted Wissahickon Creek would not freeze over. Through the implementation of stricter environmental regulations, this condition has been reversed in recent years and the Creek now freezes more frequently.

This wildly popular post, part of Archivist Alex Bartlett's #WissahickonWednesdays series, has reached 39,435(!) people and counting since first appearing on our Facebook page on January 4th. Comments from 73 people, 186 shares, and the interest continues....

Every several years, one of our Directors agrees to take on the job of leading the organization, knowing full well that they're letting themselves in for a daunting stream of new emails, a vast number of additional committee meetings and the occasional opportunity to give a pep talk to a room full of supporters and potential donors. The Chestnut Hill Conservancy has been fortunate throughout its long history in finding Directors who have been willing to take on the job, and our success today is a testament to their hard work and dedication. Few of them, however, have had quite the impact of Randy Williams, who has just stepped down as President after four eventful years.

It can be fairly said that, under his leadership, the organization has been revitalized and transformed in important respects. His success in strengthening our financial base permitted us to fill open staff positions with a remarkable cadre of professional preservationists. This completed our evolution from a small "volunteer-led" organization to one led by a highly capable professional staff. Finally, with the support of a reinvigorated Board, new donors, and broadened membership, Randy led us through a challenging process to re-focus our activities around our principal preservationist objectives, culminating in the Board's decision last year to change our name to "Chestnut Hill Conservancy."

All of us committed to the long-term preservation of Chestnut Hill have reason to be grateful to Randy for his leadership.

Randy will continue to serve on the Board of Directors as Treasurer, while Eileen Javers has assumed the position of President. We'll meet Eileen in next month's e-newsletter.

George G. H. Coates, Jr., Board Member

George has been a resident of Chestnut Hill for almost 30 years, first living in the gardner's cottage on Krisheim and then residing on Bethlehem Pike, in both with his now wife Victoria. He is a winebroker and entrepreneur and also is involved in state level policy advocacy sitting as a board member of The Commonwealth Foundation. George has been involved with a number of community organizations including the Chestnut Hill Community Association, Germantown Academy and AIM Academy. He has assisted the Chestnut Hill Historical Society with the Perennial Fete, Architectural Hall of Fame and the Major Gifts committee. Currently George is involved with the restructuring of the Henry Foundation for Botanical Research in Gladwyne, where he grew up. They have a daughter, Gardner, a freshman at Blair Academy and a son, Gowen, a seventh grader at AIM Academy. When not in Chestnut Hill they reside in Washington DC and on Andalusia.

Diane Drinker, Vice-President for Development

Diane Drinker grew up in Abington, PA and graduated from Drexel University with a degree in Marketing. Between graduation and later settling with her husband John and children Lauren and Alex in Philadelphia, Diane led the restoration of a Jens Jenson garden in Highland Park, and the creation of a new garden to enhance the Glencoe train station. Diane's career in Development at Chestnut Hill Academy, later Springside Chestnut Hill Academy, spanned 19 years until her retirement in June 2014. Diane has been an active volunteer with the Junior League helping to raise funds for the restoration of Belmont Mansion and serving as a docent at Bartram's Garden. She was on the Waterworks executive committee and was a member of Woman for the Waterworks, raising money for and overseeing the restoration of the iconic Philadelphia landmark. She was a member of the Wissahickon Garden Club, chairing numerous committees and serving a President from 2012 to 2014.

Tim Greenwood, Board Member

Tim Greenwood was born and raised in Chestnut Hill and graduated from Chestnut Hill Academy and the University of Denver (where he met his wife Sandy). Tim and Sandy, their three grown children, and three grandchildren live in the area. Tim was a Partner in the Boothby Group, a business risk management and benefits consulting firm, which was acquired by Tomkins Financial Corp. He is an Emeritus Trustee of The Philadelphia Zoo and former Vice Chair of the Independence Seaport Museum.

Dan Macey, Board Member

Dan Macey, together with his partner, Paul Savidge, bought the Louis Kahn designed Margaret Esherick House located in Chestnut Hill in 2014. Their conservation efforts have received local and national recognition from the Chestnut Hill Historical Society, the Preservation Alliance for Greater Philadelphia as well as Docomomo. His commitment to historic preservation - especially mid-century buildings - continues with his work with the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Docomomo and the Iconic House network. He has been a board member of Manitoga/The Russel Wright Design Center in Garrison, N.Y. where he worked to preserve the iconic house, property and legacy of industrial designer Russel Wright. Professionally, he works as a food stylist and writes about food and historic foodways, most recently contributing to *Savoring Gotham*, a food history of New York and the *Oxford Companion to Cheese*, an encyclopedia on cheese. His interest in good design and food presentation has lead him to teach at such institutions as Pratt Institute and become a sought-after speaker at culinary and design conferences. He sits on the board of the Historic Foodways Society of the Delaware Valley and periodically caters historically accurate meals.
